Tammy is active in the community and has a great interest in wellness. She was a member of the

board of directors for the Sacred Heart Care Center and also supports the Nexus-Gerard Family Healing Center and the Salvation Army. She believes empowering individuals with a foundation of education is the key to comprehensive change in food security.

Tammy's passion for making a positive impact on the community led to her leadership role with The Hometown Food Security Project (HFSP), a collective impact effort addressing the issues of hunger and food insecurity in Mower County, Minnesota. Established by Hormel Foods and the United Way of Mower County, HFSP mobilizes resources to bridge the food security gap across Mower County, with a vision to ensure no one goes hungry. Tammy is also active with the World Food Prize, assisting with the formation of a Youth Institute in Austin, Minnesota. She also is engaged with the World Food Program and has traveled to El Salvador to better understand the issue of global migration.

Tammy and her husband Jim Snee, who is the chairman, president and chief executive officer of Hormel Foods, also recently established an endowed faculty chair position at Baylor University to lead research efforts addressing food security through the Baylor Collaborative on Hunger and Poverty. The Jim and Tammy Snee Family Chair supports the health and human flourishing, leadership and ethics initiatives. Tammy also serves on the board of advocates for Baylor Collaborative on Hunger and Poverty.

Tammy and Jim are parents to James, a graduate of Marquette University, Joshua, a graduate of Colorado State University and Carly, a 2024 graduate of Baylor University.

Tammy has a bachelor's degree in political science from New Mexico State University.
