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Andrew D. Calvin, MD, MPH, is a preventive cardiologist, educator, and academic leader at Mayo Clinic. He earned his graduate and medical degrees from the University of Minnesota School of Public Health and Medical School. He completed internal medicine and cardiovascular disease training at Mayo Clinic through the Clinician-Investigator Training Program, followed by additional training in preventive cardiology and echocardiography. He joined the staff of Mayo Clinic Health System in Eau Claire, Wisconsin in 2015 where he leads preventive cardiology services.

Dr. Calvin holds the rank of Associate Professor of Medicine and is a Fellow of the Mayo Clinic Academy of Educational Excellence. He provides educational leadership as Chair of Education for Mayo Clinic Health System, with responsibilities spanning nursing, allied health, pre-professional, undergraduate, and graduate medical education, across 16 hospitals and 45 multispecialty clinics across Minnesota and Wisconsin. He is also the Associate Dean for Accreditation and Compliance in the Mayo Clinic School of Continuous Professional Development. In addition, he is an adjunct faculty at multiple universities across the Midwest and in the Honors Program at the University of Wisconsin–Eau Claire. His professional service includes membership on the Board of Directors of the Wisconsin Medical Society and service on the Cardiovascular Disease Longitudinal Approval Committee for the American Board of Internal Medicine. He has received numerous awards for educational innovation, including the American College of Physicians Wisconsin Chapter Community-Based Physician and Mentor Award, the Mayo Clinic Health System Innovator of the Year Award, and the William “Bill” Maierhofer, MD, Distinguished Educator Award.

Beyond his professional roles, Dr. Calvin volunteers with Scouting America as Council Vice President, supporting youth programs, leadership development, and community engagement across 14 counties in western Wisconsin.
